Finding hope for lost souls

HOW long have you been a psychic?

I have been a full-time psychic for seven years, while living in and loving Sydney. My background was working with children and adults in disabilities.

What exactly do you do?

I channel information through my senses to offer direction and clarity during a reading. My job is to remind you of what you may know. I do believe you have the answers already and, when you make time to connect with yourself and have this inner stillness, you can access this information. I tune into your energy and do my best to translate what I'm receiving.

What made you interested? Or was this a calling?

When living in Perth, I would often talk about spiritual matters with friends and always got a lovely feeling of contentment when I pulled a card from their angel decks. Then Doreen Virtue, creator of these cards, came to town. My mother and a friend wanted to go... I wasn't keen, but curiosity overcame me, so we went. A banner promoting Doreen's

course caught my eye. Before she even came on stage, something inside me went whoosh and I rushed out to the booking table, put my name down and paid for the course. I'm grateful that I listened to my intuition. I felt I was chosen to do this work.

Any skills or qualifications required?

First, I did an Angel Intuitive course with Doreen Virtue, as well as a couple of courses in palmistry. I then studied mediumship for two years, to develop and strengthen this gift of connecting with souls that have left their physical body. Before all this, I also trained to be a Louise Hay "Heal Your Life" teacher in 1999, to run workshops encouraging people to reach their goals. Everyone is born with psychic abilities — it's up to you to tap into this gift.

Any stereotypes to debunk?

That you shouldn't say anything to a psychic: let them tell you everything. It's like if a doctor asked you what your symptoms are and you said, "You're the expert, you tell me". If someone is there to "test" me and the intent is not coming from a pure place, the reading will not flow.

Why is being a psychic the best career choice for you?

My purpose is to uplift and enthuse people via readings, workshops, talks and mentor-

ship. I'm deeply devoted and love this and a conventional job would be restrictive for me.

Most rewarding part of your career?

Through my readings and intuitive mentoring sessions, I've had the pleasure to assist clients to reach their career goals or to start a business. It's very rewarding to see others go for their dreams and be excited about their lives.

Most challenging?

Clients that expect great things to happen to them, but don't take the necessary steps.

Most memorable career moments so far?

A family came to see me and I picked up their daughter, who passed away in the Bali bombing. It was comforting for her mum, dad and brother to know she was still with them. Another time, I was invited to a psychic party to connect with an aunty that had been murdered. She came through and showed me that she was strangled, as the neighbour watched on in horror. In both cases, it was the biggest gift I can offer someone: to confirm how they have passed, that their souls and personalities are still alive, and personal messages that they are able to understand.
